

Homemade Puzzle

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Overview: Puzzles are the all-time favorite activity for children and adults. It offers an opportunity for kids to express their imagination through a favorite picture or image that will come alive every time they put the puzzle together. This lesson will provide kindergarteners with special needs with a fun way to explore any subject. This activity can be used to explore self-portraits, family, family pictures etc. In addition it is an affordable and unique ways to use household items for crafts that will make any occasion a special one.

Subject Areas: ELA, Math and Art

Lesson Objectives:

Students will be able to do the following:

- I. Problem solving skills.
- 2. Learn coping skills
- 3. Identify pieces of a picture to make a whole.
- 4. Identify shapes of a picture
- 5. Practice their fine motor skills (*Differentiation*: Students will use bigger puzzle pieces, cutting, pasting and matching pictures, picture to pictures and pictures to objects. Higher functioning students will cut smaller pieces)
- 6. Teamwork concepts

Suggested Materials:

- 1. pictures, magazines, calendars
- 2. poster board
- 3. scissors
- 7. colored plastic tape
- 8. markers
- 9. for ELA: Chart paper, markers, thinking maps templates



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Warm-Up

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These sentences will be written on the board
\square Think of a place a person or thing you that is important to you.
\square Write or draw reasons why this is memorable to you.
\square What is a collage?
\square What can we make with pictures?

Directions:

Vocabulary will be provided: collage, puzzle meaningful.

- I. Pre-test: The class will be asked to raise their hands in response to: What are puzzles? What is a collage? Results will be discussed as a group.
- 2. Students will use thinking maps (circle map) to brainstorm to answer these questions.
- 3. **Modification**: Picture symbols will be provided as cues. Students will be given choices of two or three pictures symbols. Students will also be grouped according to skill level.
- 4. Students will identify a portrait of themselves or family or a picture from a magazine that interests them.
- 5. Students will discuss why they like it
- 6. Students will describe the picture.
- 7. In their writing journal, students will write descriptive feelings they get when they look at the picture.

Craft:

- 1. Students will cut the poster board to the same size of the picture to be used.
- 2. The chosen picture will be glued to the picture board.
- 3. The sides will be covered with colored tape.
- 4. The students will take the marker and draw triangle to make the puzzle pieces on the back.
- 5. With adult help, students will cut the puzzle pieces apart following the lines.
- 6. Students will be provided with a zip lock bag in order to store the puzzle pieces.

Sharing/Evaluation: Students will participate in a "show and tell" about their final product using descriptive words.
